पुस्तक की समीक्षा

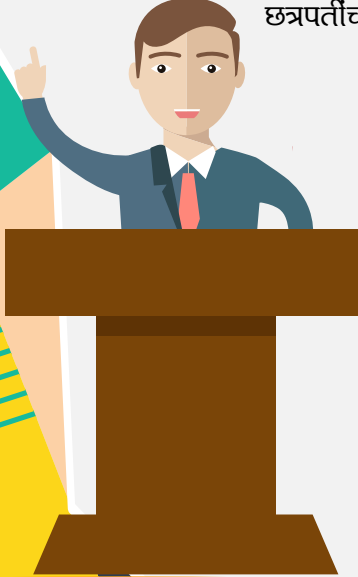

World Literacy Day



There could be nothing better, inspiring and extraordinary to talk about something like sharing my experience with reading as well as watching a movie on the book called "The Fantastic Flying books of Morris Lessmore," which is written and directed as an animation movie by William Joyce. I hope the readers of this article and the avid readers across the world will be thankful for celebrating the World Literacy Day every year on 8th September, which gives us an opportunity to share and celebrate our love for books. I wish we celebrate this day as

enthusiastically as we celebrate Christmas, Diwali, Eid or Guru Nanak Jayanti. World Literacy Day should not only be celebrated to remind us that we have to work towards eliminating illiteracy from all across the world and think and devise ways to eliminate it, but also to enjoy our love for books and spreading the message of benefits of becoming educated. And, why should we only think about it on this one particular day? In fact, it should be enjoyed every day by reading any good book of your choice. As it is mentioned in one of my favourite books called "Hints for Self-Culture" by Lala Har Dayal, a polymath, freedom fighter and a great nationalist revolutionary in India's struggle for independence, that "the aim of the knowledge is truth and truth is the need of the soul." In other words, Har Dayal emphasis was on acquiring knowledge by reading books. He emphasized that "It is our duty to train and develop our mind and acquire as much knowledge as we possibly can obtain. If we do not develop and use our brain to the utmost of our power we are more akin to the beasts than to homosapiens." So I would urge the students to acquire as much knowledge as they can by reading good books every day. To make a mark on celebrating this day, the literary club students along with the teachers in our school enjoyed solving literary quizzes and watched this movie in the month of September club periods. The literary quiz was full of surprises for the students as it had questions that were related to many unknown surprising facts about well-known authors, poets, books and things related to books from history and time. It was both nostalgic as well as fascinating to share

and enjoy the quiz with the students as well as the teachers. Shakespeare's Globe, Albert Einstein's book "Why war"?, names of one of the "Big five" English language publishing company called "Penguin", names of books in the Harry Potter series and Dumbledore's army, "Panchatantra" by Vishnu Sharma, Arthur Conan Doyle as a cricketer, Malgudi Days, "Moments" by Christiano Ronaldo, Satyajit Ray's "Shatranj ke Khiladi", Sanskrit drama "Mricchakatika" by Sudraka, and Munshi Premchand are some examples that were majestically discussed and talked about as questions in the quiz." The Fantastic Flying books of Morris Lessmore" is a 2011 American animated short film directed by William Joyce and Brandon Oldenburg. After winning over a dozen film festivals, the film was awarded the Best Animated Short Film at the 84th Academy Awards. The book is inspired by a children's book publisher named William Morris, who was also a mentor of the writer. The protagonist Morris Lessmore is modeled after a famous American film actor, comedian Buster Keaton from the silent films era. William Morris worked as a children's book publisher at Harper Collins, an English-language publishing company. He died few days after he listened to a story about a man who gave his life for books written and told to him by the writer William Joyce himself. While browsing through many movies for the club, I stumbled upon this movie and then the book. The story of the writer and the mentor was heart touching. I decided to make this as a part of our club activity so that everybody can enjoy and learn from it. The film drew particular inspiration from situations in books like the "Wizard of OZ" of a tornado and storm scene in Keaton's "Steamboat Bill, Jr", a 1928 silent comedy film.

Students of the literary club enjoyed and got inspired by the movie to develop and enjoy their love for books. Few students gave their views after watching it. They said that the story teaches us that by reading books we become wiser and can become a great writer, just like Morris Lessmore did after staying and reading in the library for many years and taking care of the books that talk, laugh, cry and eat just like we humans do. It teaches us that books are man's best friend!

The World's Best Aircraft Airbus A380



The Airbus A380 is a double-deck, wide-body, four-engine jet airliner manufactured by European manufacturer Airbus. It is the world's largest passenger airliner, and the airports at which it operates have upgraded facilities to accommodate it. It was initially named Airbus A3XX and designed to challenge Boeing's monopoly in the large-aircraft market. The A380 made its first flight on 27 April 2005 and entered commercial service on 25 October 2007 with Singapore Airlines.

History

In mid-1988, Airbus engineers led by Jean Roeder began work in secret on the development of an ultra-high-capacity airliner (UHCA), both to complete its own range of products and to break the dominance that Boeing had enjoyed in this market segment since the early 1970s with its 747. McDonnell Douglas unsuccessfully offered its smaller, double-deck MD-12 concept for sale. Roeder was given approval for further evaluations of the UHCA after a formal presentation to the President and CEO in June 1990. The megaproject was announced at the 1990 Farnborough Air Show, with the stated goal of 15% lower operating costs than the 747-400. Airbus organised four teams of designers, one from each of its partners (Aérospatiale, British Aerospace, Deutsche Aerospace AG, CASA) to propose new technologies for its future aircraft designs. The designs were presented in 1992 and the most competitive designs were used.

In January 1993, Boeing and several companies in the Airbus consortium started a joint feasibility study of a Very Large Commercial Transport (VLCT), aiming to form a partnership to share the limited market. This joint study was abandoned two years later, Boeing's interest having declined because analysts thought that such a product was unlikely to cover the projected \$15 billion development cost. Despite the fact that only two airlines had expressed public interest in purchasing such a plane, Airbus was already pursuing its own large-plane project. Analysts suggested that Boeing would instead pursue stretching its 747 design, and that air travel was already moving away from the hub-and-spoke system that consolidated traffic into large planes, and toward more non-stop routes that could be served by smaller planes.

In June 1994, Airbus announced its plan to develop its own very large airliner, designated as A3XX. Airbus considered several designs, including an unusual side-by-side combination of two fuselages from its A340, the largest Airbus jet at the time. The A3XX was pitted against the VLCT study and Boeing's

own New Large Aircraft successor to the 747. From 1997 to 2000, as the East Asian financial crisis darkened the market outlook, Airbus refined its design, targeting a 15–20% reduction in operating costs over the existing Boeing 747-400. The A3XX design converged on a double-decker layout that provided more passenger volume than a traditional single-deck design, in line with traditional hub-and-spoke theory as opposed to the point-to-point theory with the Boeing 777 after. After conducting an extensive market analysis with over 200 focus groups. Although early marketing of the huge cross-section touted the possibility of duty-free shops, restaurant-like dining, gyms, casinos and beauty parlours on board, the realities of airline economics have kept such dreams grounded.

On 19 December 2000, the supervisory board of newly restructured Airbus voted to launch an €8.8-billion programme to build the A3XX, re-christened as the A380, with 50 firm orders from six launch customers. The A380 designation was a break from previous Airbus families, which had progressed sequentially from A300 to A340. It was chosen because the number 8 resembles the double-deck cross section, and is a lucky number in some Asian countries where the aircraft was being marketed. The aircraft configuration was finalised in early 2001, and manufacturing of the first A380 wing-box component started on 23 January 2002. The development cost of the A380 had grown to €11-14 billion when the first aircraft was completed.

Voracious young reader Aditya loves to read science fiction and nonfiction books. Following is a piece of writing by him on the Structure of an Egg.

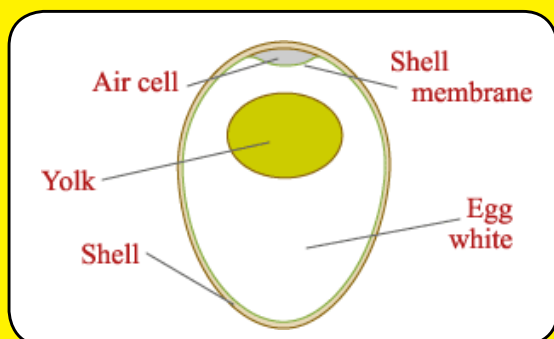
Animals that lay eggs:

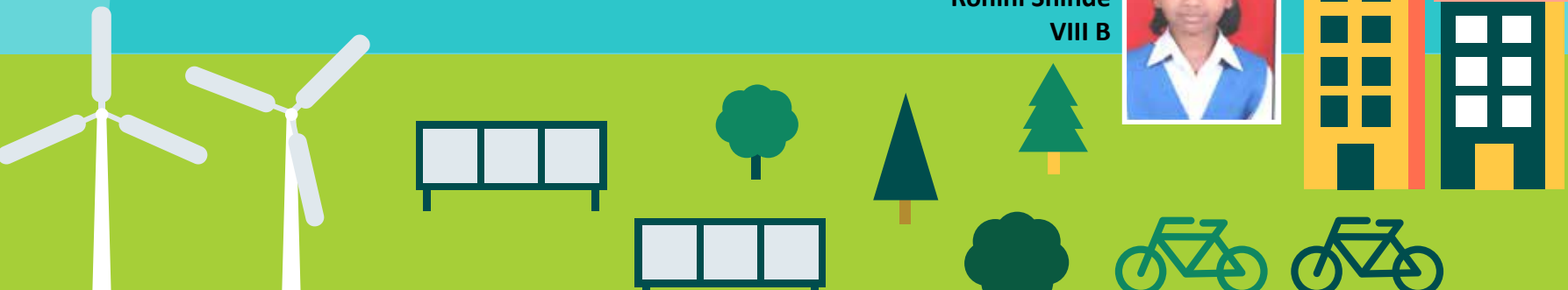

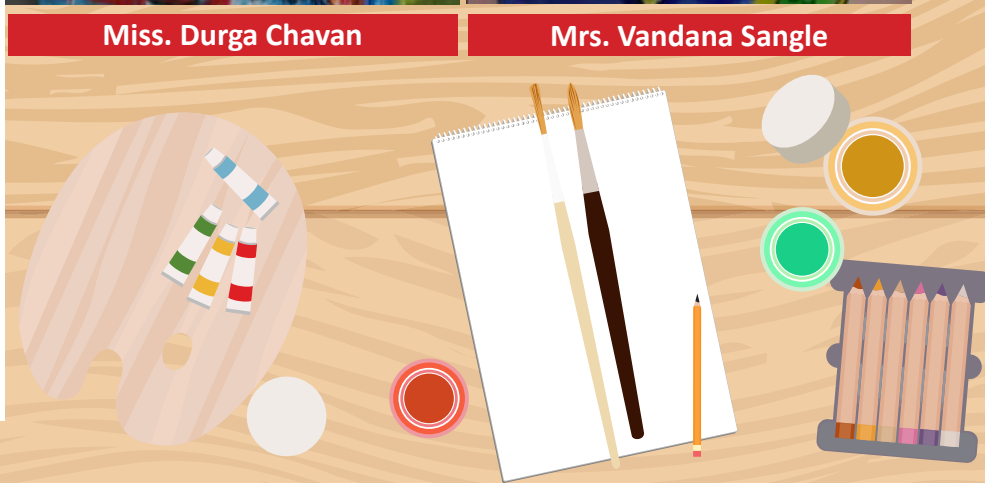

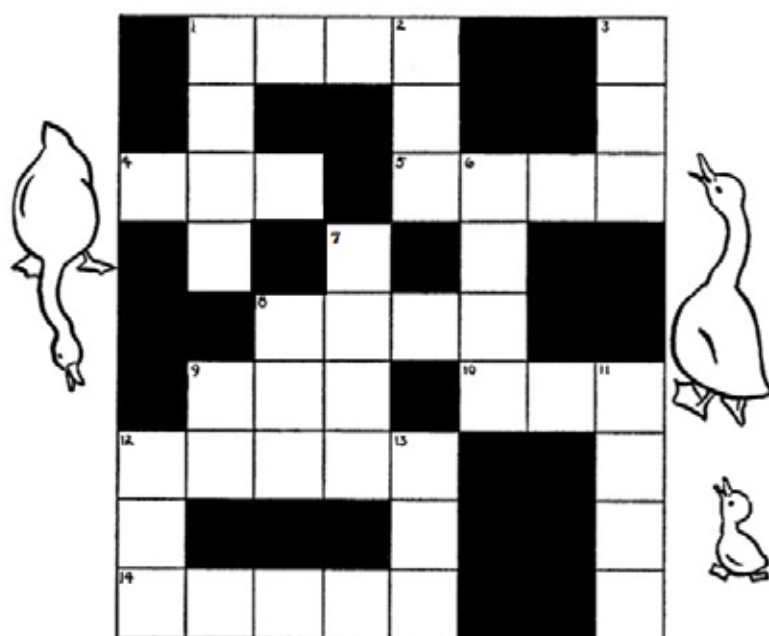
